Vale— Ken Harbron

It is with great sadness that within this past season we saw the passing of one of South Curl's revered and honoured life members, Ken Harbron.

Ken was in many ways the epitome of a true surf life saving club member having an extensive and envious record spanning a lifetime. Ken's past records are second to none covering numerous achievements that are too many to list in this short tribute.

Ken joined South Curl Curl SLSC in 1944 as a cadet at the age of 14 years old, competing in many areas of surf life saving. In his formative years, Ken was also a keen footballer representing the South Curly Club for many years in the competitions of the day.

As the records show, Ken also separately held many committee and administrative positions spanning a number of years, including that of Club Secretary, after which in 1972/3 he was elected as an honoured Life Member of the South Curl Curl SLS Club. This was later followed by Ken being elected as our Club President in 1976.

It should also be noted that under Ken's early term as Club President of SCC SLSC, the decision to adopt a motion to recognise and accept female members was taken by the then club committee. Females had previously been denied membership under Australian SLS rules. This early adoption and promotion by our club under Ken's Presidency meant that this was later passed by the SNB Branch and then by our State body, SLS NSW and finally the National Surf Life Saving Council of Australia.

Ken is also highly recognised for both his active and administrative roles and in the late 1960's Ken was heavily involved in the introduction of "Power Rescue Boats" operation to Sydney Northern Beaches SLS. He became President and was made a Life Member within the SNB Power Boat Club Association.

Ken was also regarded as a great mentor to many club members of his day, showing great compassion in helping younger members such as yours truly, and like so many members of his era, he will always be in their hearts and thoughts for many years to come.

We join with all members, friends and his family in paying tribute to Ken as an honoured club member and a great man for his contribution to surf life saving and specifically, South Curl Curl SLSC. We stand in tribute to Ken along with all members past and present today.

Vale— Bob Picard

Bob Picard, born in Manly in 1927 and living his life at South Curly, was one of the post war team that joined the Curly crew in the early 1940's and continued the strong community that had begun not too many years earlier.

At South Curly, Bob was a member of a successful surfboat crew including placing in the 1947 Australian Championships. A place in the Aussies is significant but a bigger measure of the man is the involvement in the rescue of the Launch Billy and crew in high seas offshore North Curly in 1947 - in a double ended boat with no helicopters or back up power boats. Bob and all those involved in the rescue were recognisd by the then Royal Humane Society for their bravery.


Bob continued contributing to the club through the 50's and in the 60's was part of the small team that developed the original jet powered surf life saving rescue boats. The Jack Wilson Jet Power Boat Team was formed at Freshwater by the Freshie, North and South Curly clubs and patrolled the three beaches for many years. The big jet boats were great but more agile smaller powered boats were needed. Bob was again in the team that played a big part in introducing "Rubber Duckies" to the surf rescue scene.

For his services to the club Bob was made a Life Member in 1967.

The late '60s was not the end of making a difference. By then the family was growing, so where else do you go, Curly Nippers of course, introducing the family to "Nippers" in the mid sixties at Curly.

Bob was a role model, someone always there to lend a hand, being part of something bigger and making a contribution.

Vale— Graham Knox / Zombie

On May 27, 2020 we lost a Titan of Surf Lifesaving Surfboats. Graeme James Knox, better known as "Zom" was born at the Mater Hospital on 5 August, 1946 passing away peacefully after a short battle with Cancer. Diagnosed in early February as inoperable, Zom continued to do what he loved (which was commentating surfboat events) until the shortened 2020 Season due to Covid-19.

Spending much of his younger years at Freshwater SLSC, then playing 1st Grade Rugby League with North Sydney & Manly before returning to Surf Lifesaving and Surfboat Rowing. Joining Sth Curly from Freshy in 1973, Zom joined forces with his "now mate for life", Sweephand Rob Michael (Flea) in making a formidable A Crew of himself, Gary Bartle, Immintz Rama and Mick Gloag.

Their crew went on to great success, winning "heaps of races" (as Zom put it) when recollecting his rowing Career. Most notable was 3rd, NSW State Titles at Tathra and 1st at the "Interstate - Non Australian Championship" a few days prior to Aussies, Glenelg 1974.

Some older members of the club would remember Jen performing Peggy Lee's "Mr Wonderful" to a "shirtless, coke bell bottomed panted" Zom at the Talent Quest.

Zom was involved in rowing with Sth Curly until 1988. One of the most memorable moments I have of that time was watching Ribs take the "Wave of the Carnival" at Freshwater in 1988 with the crew of Zom, Wayne Stacey, Tim Kerrigan and Jay Flower. The photo of this wave made the Back page of the Manly Daily. Needless to say, it all went pear-shaped on the inside break and the boat rolled (not due to the fault of the Curly Crew mind you!).

Zom's children Vanessa, Simone and Nathan all Patrolled down at Curly throughout their teenage years. Taking inspiration from their father, Simone was part of the first all Female Surfboat rowing crew with Manly, while Nathan held position of Sth Curly Craft Captain over multiple seasons, helping mentor young board paddlers.

Zom, his wife Jennifer ran the Social Committee during the 80's and the Knox family ran the Sth Curly Kiosk through 1990's – early 2000's on the Surf Club's behalf. Making those famous "Curly Burgers & Vege Burgers" for the hoards who came down on a Summer's Day.

Graeme was also a "big picture" personality in multiple arenas working for the betterment of the Community, in particular Surfboat Rowing. He was instrumental in the creation of the Surfboat Rower's League which went on to become the now ASRL, The Uncle Toby's Surfboat competition, Brewarrina-Bourke Outback Surfboat classic (200km down the Barwon River over 3 days), Ocean Thunder, Beach Football Refereeing, countless hours officiating at Surf lifesaving Carnivals and other tasks that make our Community's lives "better". An example of this was Zom delivering the Harbord Public School students' weekly deposits down to Bendigo (Freshwater) Community Bank. Such was Graeme's "sense of community".



Another community location Zom (and Jen) loved was the Harbord Hilton. Many of South Curly's members who have frequented the HBH these past 40 years were always greeted by the smile from Zombie and a good catch up over a cold "schooner of black". This was indeed the location where Flea and Zom first met and recruited Zom into the A Crew!

The last 20 years sawn Zom take ownership of the microphone in commentary of our local surfboat carnivals. There were few others who knew as much about the crews competing, who was sweeping and their record of past success?

The Zom packed enormous amounts into his shortened life. Other contributions are mentioned in various tributes to the Great Man via other media sources and Associations.

Graeme has left a legacy on the Northern Beaches that will be long remembered. We at South Curly were fortunate to have him as part of our family directly and indirectly since the 1970's.


Zom was on the Goldie when (Sean) Seen Stacey swept his Junior Boat Crew to Aussie Gold (first since 52) and opened his accommodation to a Curly party straight after the victory. At the time, a young Elton was part of the crew and went on to marry Zom's daughter, Vanessa. Of Zom's seven grandchildren, the eldest Julian now proudly wears the Royal Blue, White and Gold competing for Curly.

Even in his final weeks, Zom was cheering his beloved 5th Curly Crews to success at the State Champion-ships.

President's Report

It was hard to put a positive spin on season 2019-20 when everything ground to such a sudden halt. First the State was rocked by bushfires, then we had a once in a decade storm, which buried the beach in burnt timber. Then came the lock-down due to the COVID-19 virus. However up until then, the season had been very successful. We should be grateful that we got so much in before it all stopped, and at least our Nippers managed to complete their season!

The strong involvement of Nipper parents, plus the progression of Nippers through to cadets, juniors, seniors and competitive rowers is one of the most significant reasons why our Club is so great. Surf education and safety for all ages is one of our key objectives. Each year the juniors have a board training camp and this year was no exception. Our Cadets also had their annual start of season trip up North to Treachery at Seal Rocks.

Our special needs 'Ripper Nippers' program continued this season, and I would like to thank all the dedicated parents and helpers who make this so successful. Also thanks to Mona Vale SLSC for again hosting the Special Needs Carnival again this season. It was pleasing to see such a diversity of results with South Curl Curl well represented. After the surf boats, this is the next most competitive section of the Club.

As with the previous year, this season we ran with 25 patrols. Each Patrol completes 5 or 6 half-day patrols for the season. I would like to personally thank everyone who put in the hours and kept our beach open and safe. This season we had 242 active seniors 15 and above, 40 cadets and 382 junior members.

Our education and training continued soundly this season, and was near to examination of the final bronze squad when the shut-down occurred. We therefore have a trained group so close to completion, and just awaiting the chance to finish. I would like to commend all the dedicated trainers and helpers for their efforts, and hope they found it as rewarding as their students did.

Our season in surf boats was also going extremely well until the shut-down. The State carnival was described as taking out the full set of silverware; this was a 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th 5th and 6th in respective finals, plus another 5th in the relay which should have been a 1st. Masters had a 1st in the 240 years event. This really counts as 8 finalists out of 9 divisions, which is an amazing achievement. We also had another successful national representation in the U23's this season. From what I heard, winning the right to represent Australia is tougher than the race itself. We had 4 crews in the Interbranch, 2 crews selected to represent State (U19 girls and Open men's), plus the one representing Australia. Four crews also made the Australian Open title finals. To quote our esteemed sweep Termite, this was shaping up to be our most successful season ever. Let's hope the momentum carries forward!

Both our Club Championships and the annual Ocean Swim from South Curl Curl to Freshwater were cancelled. We did however manage to get in another cricket day, which was a rather competitive event followed by a nice laid-back social event back at the Club House. South Curl Curl has continued to be a real niche location on the Northern Beaches, being so close to popular tourist places like Manly but being a small community-minded location. Many who find south Curly are pleasantly surprised and often keep coming back .



This has been my third year as President, and I would like to thank our dedicated committee who make my role manageable while working full-time. One of the remaining exercise options lately has been ocean swimming, and a group of locals have really got into it with swims almost every day. Whilst not a club activity, last season four of our regular swimmers joined the club, completed their bronze and are now patrolling members.

I would like to thank our sponsors, who have been instrumental not just in helping purchase essential equipment but also for being involved in and around our Club. Our biggest sponsor is Freshwater Community Bank, a branch of Bendigo Bank. They have supported us for many years now, and we really appreciate the close working relationship. Sydney Beach Homes has an increased involvement, and Stone Real Estate continues as a long-term supporter as well.

Our Café – 'Gusto on the Beach' continued to trade through the pandemic, and thanks to all the management and staff, and also to Seven Miles Coffee for their support.

Here's looking forward to a new season, run as normal as possible whilst maintaining safe social distances and watching out for each other.

Secretary's Report

Despite the additional challenges presented by the COVID pandemic South Curly maintained its record of safe operation throughout the 2019-20 season. Thank you to all members for your contributions throughout the season – particularly your prompt response and compliance with the changing circumstances presented by the restrictions.

Thanks go to the Patrol Captains and all patrolling members for keeping the beach safe. The season was cut short this year when patrols and normal use of beaches was shut down by SLSNSW – the final patrol occurred on March 22. The Club plans to acknowledge qualifying members with a National Patrol Service Award in recognition of their sustained service. Many thanks go to Chuck and Scott for their work running the IRBs again this season. The IRB section has a full complement of rescue ready equipment enabling response by the Club to incidents at all times, subject to SOPs.

Well done to our dedicated group of Training Officers who run the Club's Bronze Medallion courses, advanced courses and proficiencies throughout the season. Our Patrol numbers and depth of qualifications remains amongst the best in the Branch. This means that our patrol roster requires 5 or 6 half day patrols per member for the season, less than many other Clubs.

Thank you to Nipper Chairman Saul Carroll and all Age Managers and many helpers who ran Junior Activities this season. We are grateful to Saul for his work running Nippers over the past three years and welcome Matt Fitzgerald as incoming Chairman next season. Fortunately the Juniors were able to complete their schedule of Sunday morning activities however the end of season trip away was cancelled due to the restrictions.

We thank outgoing Resident Officers Charlotte and Mike for their sterling service over the past three years. At the same time we welcome incoming ROs Daana and Jacob and wish them a successful tenure in this important role. The caretakers flat has received a much needed refresh and looks as good as new.

The South Curly cafe adapted well to the imposition of pandemic restrictions and continued to trade profitably with the takeaway only format. The high number of walkers using the South Curly beach front during lockdown no doubt assisted the café operation. Thanks go to Brendan, Lisa and their team for running the café successfully during this challenging period.

The building will receive some much needed maintenance from Council during the off-season including repair of the corroded lintel in the patrol room and repainting the exterior of the building. Earlier in the year Council provided a draft lease to Branch and the SNB Clubs for review and feedback. South Curly has provided comments to Branch and feedback from all involved Clubs will be consolidated as part of the lease negotiation process with Council. The Club will request that the building footprint area be slightly enlarged to improve storage space and access. The current lease expires in August however the Clubs use of the building may continue until the new lease is finalised.

The use of technology continues to develop at South Curly. Due to the COVID restrictions the Committee conducted two meetings (April, May) using an electronic platform as physical meetings at the Club were not allowed. In June the restrictions were relaxed and most participants attended the Club for the monthly meeting and a few preferred the electronic option provided. SLSA eLearning has become an important means of delivering member training. The annual Bronze Medallion proficiency includes an online component that all patrolling members are required to complete. The Club Committee members have also undertaken online training and recently undertook a Governance course intended to help the group understand its management responsibilities.



Thanks to our many Club, Branch and State sponsors whose continued support is much appreciated. Finally, thank you to all committee members for their service throughout 2019-20 and we look forward to working together again next season. The Club membership is similar to prior years.

Club Captain's Report

If you want to sum up 2020 in a word, it would be UNPRECEDENTED!

We kicked off the 2019/2020 season in the usual fashion, with patrolling members performing their volunteer duties at our glorious beach keeping the public safe. Training for courses commenced, the competition season kicked off, annual proficiencies were completed, nippers started. Business as usual...... Surf Lifesaving NSW became part of NSW State Emergency Service, and was soon put to the test, with numerous call outs to members to assist with the devastating and UNPRECEDENTED storm, flood and bushfire crises that ensued.



Making the most of the swells

The Branch Director of Lifesaving, Adrian Hill, passed on his thanks to the members who responded to callouts. I would also like to personally thank the South Curly members who helped out, going above and beyond their usual club duties in these difficult times.

And just when we all thought that we could start to move forward after these devastating events, another UNPRECEDENTED event in the form of pestilence reared its ugly head. COVID-19/Coronavirus/SARS-CoV-2 - call it what you will but this pesky little virus triggered a pandemic, dramatically altering our way of living as we know it.

To protect the safety and welfare of volunteer lifesavers and the public, the SLS NSW Board made the UNPRECEDENTED decision to cancel all volunteer patrol services for the remainder of the season. As a result, the 2019/2020 patrolling season ended prematurely at the end of March and the Club went into lockdown.

As I write this report, restrictions are easing but life as we knew it has changed and we are all still in uncertain unsettling times adjusting to a 'new norm'. Your patience and cooperation in the coming months and next season will be greatly appreciated.



SIGNIFICANT DEVEPLOPMENT THIS SEASON

Following a NSW Coronial inquiry a number of recommendations were implemented this season by SLS NSW, Branches and Clubs.

All our Patrol Captains completed Supplementary eLearning for Patrol Captains and attended a mandatory face to face session run by Branch Duty Officers. Going forward all Patrol Captains will be required to complete an annual Patrol Captains proficiency.

GEAR INSPECTION

Well done and thank you to all involved in the Gear Inspection on 18 August 2019 – special mentions go to Steve Birch, Woody, Pete Tesoriero, Cathie Dossetor, Shane Burke, Pete Allen, Chuck, Graeme Dominish, Spook, Matt Campbell, Mike Le Geyt, Saul Carrol, Matt Fitzgerald and Alex Braaskma.

NEW EQUIPMENT

4 new radios, 2 in the IRB shed for emergency callouts.

Yellow resus bags - one via NSW government grant. Life jackets for the IRBs (mandatory requirement). Rescue board stands – one of the recommendations from the Port Macquarie inquest.

Patrol equipment table - thought it was a useful idea to get the old 'sharpie' pen out and write all of the equipment required to be put out when on patrol. Feedback was positive so this will continue into the next season.





PATROL OPERATIONS APP

This year we went paperless with the patrol logs (with the exception of a couple of, dare I say, UNPRECEDENTED instances!!)

Thank you to the Patrol Captains and Patrol App Champions for facilitating this. I would like to commend you on embracing the technology. I know that a few of you struggle with change and were all too happy to let me know it! Hopefully COVID has made you all even more tech savvy.

Ben is a skillful waterman. He enjoys the water and patrol duties. He has also helped with the Bronze Medallion training, water safety, IRB training and other club events. Congratulations Ben.

Patrol Captain of the Year - Lloyd Harrison

Lloyd is one top notch PC. He was appointed PC of Patrol L about 3 years ago with mainly newly qualified nipper parent Bronze Medallion holders. Lloyd has maintained a cohesive patrol team who are always having fun whilst patrolling South Curly. Lloyd always contacts the patrol a week before. He is organised, delegates roles, briefs the team at the beginning of the patrol including getting the all-important coffee order. Treasurer's Report

It gives me great pleasure to present the financial report for the year ended 30 April 2020. I am pleased to report that our cash position increased \$51,662 over the year. As at 30 April 2020, cash and cash equivalents were a healthy \$315,003.

The income statement shows a net deficit for the year of \$50,038, but this includes \$141,560 of non-cash expenses; depreciation of fixed assets of \$133,281 and a write down in the carrying value of clothing inventory of \$8,279 to more correctly reflect the lower of cost or net realisable value. Underlying cash profit was \$91,522.

Capital purchases in the year totalled \$49,861, comprising mainly leasehold improvements and equipment for the café of \$36,389. The club also received \$8,500 as a contribution towards forthcoming security capital works, which has not been reported as income.

The following are highlights from the income and expenditure statements:

Cafe "Gusto on the Beach"

The cafe operated for a full season and generated a \$63,000 surplus for the club, plus \$9,840 of equipment hire income and increased Seven Miles Coffee rebates of \$20,657 (mainly because the rebates for the April 19 year were not received until June 19).

Donors and Grants

A full list of donors, sponsors and grant income is included in the detailed income statement. Significant contributions included:

- Freshwater Community Bank Bendigo, \$5,600
- Seven Miles Coffee sponsorship, \$5,000
- Sydney Beach Homes, \$2,000 as a key sponsor and contributor to our surfboat activities.

Other income highlights:

- Membership subscriptions were at \$57,964, 2% lower than the prior year;
- Hall hire and social function income were negatively impacted by COVID-19 lockdowns, commencing in March 20. Prior year social function income (and expense) also included the 100 year celebration revenues and costs;
- The annual ocean swim event was not held in April 20 due to COVID-19 restrictions; and
- Interest income increased \$3,708 to \$8,428 due to timing of interest receipts and higher average term deposit balances throughout the year.

Chief Instructor's Report

The season started off in the usual fashion.

Shortly after gear inspection our training team completed their pre-season updates and re-endorsements. This was on top of the extremely time-consuming Certificate IV in Training & Assessment (TAE40116) upgrades that some of our training team completed to meet the latest national vocational education and training (VET) requirements.

Our patrol captains were the next cab off the rank. This season all of our patrol captains completed the 'Supplementary Learning for Patrol Captains' online module and attended a face to face session with a Branch Duty Officer / Rescue Coordinator (RCO). This training is the 'new normal' and addresses a number of findings from the Port Macquarie coronial inquest and workplace requirements (although we are volunteers our surf club is a workplace and SLS NSW is now part of NSW Emergency Services).

Patrols started in September and we started the annual 'grind' of encouraging members to renew their membership and complete proficiencies. To put the task into perspective our club has approximately 300 patrolling members and we processed proficiencies for 650 individual awards.

This season SLSA allocated mandatory e-learning to all patrolling members, with more mandatory e-learning expected next season with the roll out of the new Public Safety and Aquatic Rescue (Bronze) Manual. The mandatory e-learning is allocated by SLSA and SLS NSW, so there is no point whinging to the training team about it or ignoring it.

For those of you that need to be proficient by a specific date (particularly competitors), please bear in mind that the date and time that a module is completed is recorded on the e-learning platform. Despite multiple prompts, we were still following up members right up to 31 December to which placed an unnecessary strain on the training team and is a thankless task.

In what seems like ages ago, our U14s started training for the Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) and we had another enthusiastic bunch sign up for the spring Bronze Medallion squad. Both squads completed their assessments in December, and quickly integrated into their patrols and club activities.

The squad was trained by Mike and Jodi Le Geyt, Natalie Neary (Training Officers), Paul Monnington, Ken Johnston and Nick Careless (Age Managers), parents, and some of our younger patrolling members – special mentions go to Zara Howes, Gordon Carroll, Chloe O'Reilly and Amelia Byrne.

With our SRC courses we will continue to prioritise Nippers that have come through our Nippers program.

Bronze Medallion Spring Squad

We ran our usual Spring and Summer squads this season. Besides COVID-19, our main challenge at South Curly continues to be unfriendly surf conditions with the 'Beach closed' sign going up.

Thank you to Sue Hanley, Natalie Nearly, Glenn Everingham and Chuck who trained the squads, our Bronze Assessors – Chuck Berry, Glenn Everingham, Craig Blake, and Mike Le Geyt, and the many members that help out with training sessions.





A steady stream of members volunteered (or could not refuse Kevin Moffat's invitation to sign up) for IRB crew and driver training, we ran two Advanced Resuscitation Techniques (ART) courses in house, and some members completed Branch facilitated courses to improve their knowledge and skills.

Kevin Moffat was once again the organiser of most of the IRB training, and was assisted by Graeme Dominish, Chuck, Peter Allen, Lloyd Harrison, Matt Campbell and Ben Webster. Chuck, Steve Birch, and Andrew Blenkinsop all assessed IRB Awards during the season.

Advanced Resuscitation courses

We are now running the ART courses in house again, which has several benefits:

- We train members on our club equipment, so they know how to use and maintain it.
- Members have time to absorb and retain the required knowledge.
- We can incorporate adequate scenario practice, which is what really matters when incidents occur.



Our Bronze summer squad kicked off in early February, only to be suspended a few weeks later due to COVID-19. COVID-19 impacted 250 Bronze Medallion candidates from 15 clubs across our Branch, and scuppered the Advanced Resuscitation, Beach Management and Gold Medallion sessions that we were planning to run towards the end of the season. Voluntary patrols also ceased early, so we expect members to be a little more rusty than usual at the start of next season.

Other highlights for the season:

- Mike and Chuck completed the Certificate IV in Training and Assessment (TAE40116) upgrade, and were appointed as Assessors-in-Charge (AIC) at Branch Central Venue Assessments.
- Sam Le Geyt completed his Gold Medallion (Advanced Lifesaving) proficiency.
- Ben Humel is now a RWC (jetski) operator as part of Branch Support Operations.
- Martin Brannan and Matthew Campbell are now UAV (drone) operators.
- South Curly Curl members once again supported the Freshwater Community Bank® Branch of Bendigo Bank Community CPR Courses.



Our main focus at the start of the 2020/21 season will be the roll out of the updated Public Safety and Aquatic Rescue (Bronze) Manual and the new Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) and Bronze Medallion courses. Before we can deliver the new courses, our endorsed trainers and assessors will need to attend training sessions and complete upgrades.

We have yet to see the skills maintenance (proficiencies) requirements for the 2020/21 season, however there will be additional content to cover and changes to patrol operations (for example, Bronze Medallion holders will no longer use oxygen).

Other priorities for the 2020/21 season are as follows:

- Upgrading Advanced Resuscitation Technique (ART) holders to the latest ART[AID] award.
- Supporting our members to gain higher awards, including the Gold Medallion.
- Continuing to developing our 'Next Generation', including new and potential Patrol Captains.
- Looking forward to and enjoyable and COVID free 2020/21 patrol season.

South Curly Rippers All Ability Group

South Curl Curl offers a modified nipper program for children & youth with a disability and has done now for eight nipper seasons. The program has been developed and supported by the club to allow inclusion for all children, youth and adults to be able to learn about surf awareness and skills as well as participate in activities such as beach races, flags, wade and swim races. As members of this group become more confident in the water, they learn skills to be able to use nipper surfboards in the breakers as well as be supported by older and SRC club members to go out further into the surf to catch a wave into shore. Family members are encouraged to participate with their child so everyone has the opportunity to share in the excitement as each member masters new skills throughout the season.

Members of 'Rippers' are encouraged to join in their age mainstream group if they wish and are welcome to participate in both groups, however there were no Rippers that wished to step up to regular nippers groups this season.
