Vale— Bruce Buckingham

Bruce joined South Curl Curl SLSC in October 1947 when aged 17. He was an apprentice carpenter working for a shipping company on the Sydney wharves and one of his bosses was long time SCC President Arthur Olsen. Arthur talked Bruce in to coming over to SCC one Sunday. As soon as he arrived at the beach he was ambushed by boat captain Richie Roberts who asked him to have a try at rowing a surfboat. Well Bruce felt that Richie must have been very impressed with how he rowed because within an hour Richie had offered him a spot in his crack Junior boat crew. It was not until the next weekend that he realised that SCC only had three other juniors. So it was him or no-one.

From that moment he was hooked. He would stay with a number of other members at "the shack" (a run down house on the hill close to Stewart House where the weekend rent was 10 shillings); arriving on Friday night after work and not going home until the last ferry on Sunday. That was his routine, summer and winter, for nearly 5 years.

The Junior crew went on to win the 1945 State Title in a canter. Due to the war, there was no Aussies that year but given that up to then, no crew from outside NSW had ever won the Aussies he considered this one that got away.

Moving to Seniors in 1946 the next 5 seasons brought two Aussie silver medals (in very close finishes) and he made two other Aussie finals. The Aussie Gold finally came in 1952 and he hung up his oar. It was the last Open Men Gold Medal SCC was to win until 2021.

Winters were about Rugby League and surfboat maintenance. SCC had its own junior league team and Bruce was a member of the B Grade Premiers in 1947. He even scored a try in the GF; the only meat pie of his football career. In the same year while sanding back the surfboat he was on hand to witness a launch in distress off Curly heading for the break in a 10 foot plus surf. Running to North Curl Curl to borrow a boat, the SCC boys headed to sea and managed to safely bring in the five occupants. Bruce was awarded a Royal Humane Society medal for his part in the rescue.

Bruce met Betty McPherson soon after he arrived at SCC and whilst at first she played hard to get his persistence and perseverance paid off and they were married in February 1951. The wedding date put him out of rowing in the 1951 Aussies which were held for the first time in Perth. Richie Roberts was disappointed that he did not decide to have his honeymoon as a trip along the Nullarbor so he could compete in Perth. Strangely Richie's DNA seems to have been passed on to some current SCC sweeps!

After competition ended Bruce turned his hand to administration and was one of the founders in establishing the Nipper movement having been the inaugural NSW Deputy President.

He became a life member of SCC in 1967 and in the same year took over from Richie as Club President; a position he held for 7 years.

Through the 70's and 80's one of his great joys was the trips to Aussie Titles. Towing the surfboat or carting juniors and cadets in his green dodge truck, he did trips to Tasmania, Victoria, Queensland and South Australia and two trips across to Perth to make up for missing out in 1951.

He kept his love for rugby league by picking up the referees whistle in 1955. He became a regular first grade linesman and even got to officiate in an Australia v New Zealand test match. He was a Life Member of the Manly Warringah Referees Association.

In 1978 he sold up and moved from the house that he had built on the land that was once "the shack" that overlooked his beloved south curly. He owned and operated motels at Tumut, Ulladulla and Fingal before succumbing to the grey nomad bug and caravanning around Australia. It was his caravanning days that gave him the opportunity to participate in his favourite pastime....talking. His story telling was renowned and many of them about South Curl Curl and boat rowing.

Eventually with caravanning behind him he and Betty moved to a retirement village in Fingal. Betty died in 2014. He stayed at the village until early 2020 with a stoicism and independence that belied his age. He then moved to a nursing home at Shoal Bay where he ended his days.

In one of his last lucid moments he witnessed the medal haul of SCC crews at the Aussies at Alexandra Headland and was over the moon with the victory by the open men's crew. He felt that after 69 years he could finally pass on the mantle.

He died on 5 June aged 94.

President's Report

This season was a significant recovery from the previous one, which was plagued by covid related shut-downs. The Christmas lockdown still wiped out a couple of weeks, and our social functions were still significantly impacted. Many competition dates were moved at short notice, however beyond that it was back to business as usual for our Club.

Our highlight for the year has to be our best ever results in Surf Boats and Champion Lifesaver. Interestingly, apart from a couple of exceptions they were the only areas in which the Club really competes. For U15 Champion Lifesaver, at State we had 1st Luca Stein and 2nd Logan Howes, and at Aussies 1st Logan Howes and 5th Luca Stein. Congratulations to both Logan and Luca, I'm sure you will both continue with great results in future years. Bill and Peter Yeates are back and proving their value as quality trainers with very short lead-time. Their focus and attention to all areas of the competition really made the difference.

In the Surf Boats at Aussies we achieved an unprecedented 4 gold medals, 2 silver and one bronze. This was our first open male surf boat win in 46 years, and what a tight race it was! Our other golds were U19 girls for the 2nd time, U23 male, and 240 years masters. Our new 200 years crew got silver, as did our U19 men. Our boat relay crew got bronze. This has made 2021 the most successful season in the history of the Club and really a once in a century (or lifetime) result. Everything came together with hard training, exceptional sweeps and some luck on the day. Congratulations to all those who competed, and thanks to all those who made it possible. The core of the this team is Rob 'Termite' Lowery, Mark 'Gus' Spiteri, Chris 'Ribs' Flemming, and Wayne 'Zulu' Settree.

This year the President's award went to Rob 'Termite' Lowery, for his excellent effort in the following areas:

- Exceptional results in the boats as mentioned above,
- Support for his crews, his patrol and upcoming juniors,
- Water rescues – mostly out of hours, sometimes genuine life saving acts and sometimes as a family team but always willing to put the safety of others ahead of his own.

Congratulations Termite, it's a pleasure to give this award.

Nippers had a mostly normal season. The main challenges were beach closed days, the December covid shut-down wiping out Christmas, and a big storm on the last day of the season to impact presentation. Thanks to Matt, Alex and the vast number of age managers and helpers who managed to proceed through the season successfully despite the extra covid restrictions. Our special needs 'Ripper Nippers' program continued this season as well, and thanks to Kirsten Quinn and all the volunteers who assisted. The cadet camp to Treachery Seal Rocks proceeded as planned, and the end of season surf safari to Race-course Beach (near Bawley Point) was a huge success again.

As with the previous year, this season we ran with 25 patrols. Each Patrol completes 5 or 6 half-day patrols for the season. I would like to personally thank Jodi for her captaincy, and everyone who put in the hours and kept our beach open and safe. This season we had 265 active seniors 15 and above, 39 cadets and 365 junior members. Total club membership was 965, which is slightly higher than the previous year.

Our education and training continued soundly this season. I would like to commend all the dedicated trainers under Mike's leadership, and all supporters for their efforts. This is essential to maintaining the ongoing long-term viability of the Club and our success is the envy of many other clubs.

Our Club Championships finally occurred on 1st May, and the annual Ocean Swim event from South Curl Curl to Freshwater on 2nd May. Conditions were perfect for the event, which always makes a huge difference. Thanks to everyone who made these events possible. Special mention to James Earngey for helping with the championships, and Cathie Proctor for again leading the Ocean Swim committee.

I would like to thank our dedicated committee and those who support them behind the scene. It's pleasing to be involved with such a strong club where every position is filled by such enthusiastic individuals. Congratulations to Jeff Hewitt for his 30 years service award for officiating. Thanks to Scott Taylor for all his years as IRB Captain. If anyone could get a motor restarted it was Scott!

I would like to thank our sponsors, who have been instrumental not just in helping purchase essential equipment but also in being involved in and around our Club. Our biggest sponsor is Freshwater Community Bank, a branch of Bendigo Bank. They have continued to support us for many years now, and we really appreciate the close working relationship. Sydney Beach Homes has continued with strong involvement, and ongoing thanks to Stone Real Estate Dee Why.

Secretary's Report

I am pleased to comment on the activities for the 20/21 season and refer you to the 103rd Annual Report that includes the Audited Financial Statement and Balance Sheet for the year ended 30th April 2021 and specific sections that provide more detailed information.

At season start, the Executive Committee and Office Bearers were elected by Members at the Annual General Meeting on 2nd August 2020 with the former consisting of Graeme Dominish, Glenn Everingham, Peter Lowther, Paul Brittain and Jodi Le Geyt. At the September Committee Meeting, Peter Lowther stepped down as Secretary with the position filled as Casual Vacancy by Peter Yeates. We thank Peter Lowther for his many years of service in the Club Committee in a variety of roles.

Impact of COVID-19 pandemic

The ramifications of COVID-19 pandemic were again felt through-out the 20/21 season and the Club would like to take this opportunity to extend its gratitude to Members for their continued assistance, understanding and adherence with COVID restrictions and the changing requirements as directed by Surf Lifesaving Australia and various government bodies. Importantly, South Curly was able to deliver to its Member's and community an array of lifesaving, education, surf sports and member activities including some social, community and surf sports events and a comprehensive Nippers program whilst still maintaining its proud record of safety at its beach.

Membership

The 20/21 Season saw a slight increase in membership numbers across most of the major membership categories (all figures provided by Branch). The small reduction in the number of Nippers was offset by increases in active juniors, active seniors and Associate members and when compared with Branch figures are reassuring that the Club continues to grow and be able to achieve its primary role of saving lives at the beach and undertake appropriate preventative actions. Our total membership for the 20/21 season was 928. Table 1 provides a breakdown of the membership base for both the 2019/20 and 2020/21 seasons.

Patrols & IRBs

Our thanks and congratulations to the Patrols, in particular the Patrol Captains, IRB drivers & crew, patrolling members and assistance provided by SRC holders, whose diligence ensured a safe beach with no major incidents to report during patrol hours. Volunteers patrolled on those important public holidays including Christmas & Boxing Day, Australia Day, Good Friday etc. Thanks to the Club Captain and Patrols Supervisor, Jodie Le Geyt and Kevin Moffat respectively, for implementing and managing the many directions from Surf Lifesaving and government bodies and proficiencies within the Club. SLSA eLearning was particularly helpful in providing key training to Members.

Once again IRBs were kept fully operational for all patrols and available for emergency use. This would not be possible without the endless hours done by Matt Campbell and Chuck Berry to perform repairs and maintenance of the IRBs.

A special thanks to those Members who respond urgently to Emergency Rescue calls outside the Club's patrolling hours. These activities frequently go under radar but are performed expertly under very demanding conditions.

Training

The club is well supported by the Chief Training Officer, Mike Le Geyt, and Training Officers who run the Club's Bronze Medallion course, advanced award courses and assist Nippers with their SRC program. These activities underpin our patrolling base and ensure that the required frequency and duration of Member patrols remain the envy of the 21 surf clubs on the Northern Beaches.

Nippers

Despite the COVID-19 restrictions our juniors were able to experience a variety of water and beach conditions in a well run and coordinated Nippers program. Congratulations to Matt Fitzgerald, Age Managers and Associate members for all their assistance through-out the season as it's a huge task to successfully run a Nipper program that is COVID-19 safe and compliant. Many thanks to those performing water safety during Nippers. Feedback from Safari attendees was fantastic and the Club thanks all those who donated their time and support to this activity.

Competition

The training, coaching, participation and competition results of this season's carnivals, including Branch, State, Aussies and ASRL are nothing short of exceptional. I am reminded by a conversation I had with the sweeps who had said that this has been building for a long time and that across the board countless hours are spent training, coaching and competing at carnivals by our competitors in surf-boats and champion life saver and our coaches, officials and support people. A job well done by all.

To compete we must have sufficient officials at each carnival and are frequently requested to provide IRBs for water safety. On behalf of the Club well done to everyone who competed, irrespective of whether you gained a medal, made the Semis, or helped make a team, and our coaches, IRB and officials. This year also marked the return of competitors for Champion Life Saver.

Community Service

The Club assisted with a number of community service events during the year

- Members provided water safety for the Murray Rose Malabar Magic swim on February 21st
- The Club organised and held the annual South Curl Curl Ocean Swim 2021 on May 2nd. This year was another great success, with participants rating the event highly. Our thanks to everyone who assisted with this event.
- IRB support (Kevin Moffat and Lachlan Clarke) to communities at risk during the floods.

Functions

The Club was used for several functions, for internal club events, training for Bronze medallion, SRC and Champion Life Saver training, member's functions, SNB Branch and other external events through-out the 20/21 season. Revenue from hall hires was impacted by COVID-19 through-out the season.

Building

Some maintenance was performed on the club and the Club's exterior was repainted. Further works are planned for the Gym during the off-season. South Curl Curl has now received the finalised Club lease and the all-important Maintenance Responsibilities Schedule. These documents plus its request to slightly enlarge the club's footprint are to be discussed with Council at the end of August. The Club's use of the building will continue until the new lease is finalised.

Equipment

To help reduce the pressure placed on our volunteers the club is committed to providing access to appropriate equipment. Recently the Club purchased a 'Can-Am Defender HD8A PRO' through a 50% subsidy grant to assist with Emergency rescues, roving patrols to mid-curl and of course transporting our surfboats, IRB and patrol equipment to and from the beach. Special thanks to Matt Campbell, Chuck Berry and Kevin Moffat for their assistance in training our Members prior to next season.

Sponsorships and grants

A number of sponsorship and grant applications were submitted through-out the year and are now tracked at Committee Meetings by Glenn Everingham. The club was successful in receiving a 50% subsidy grant for the 'Cam-Am Defender HD8A PRO'.

Technology

This year the Club embarked on technology plan to upgrade the following keys areas: Access control and WiFi; NBN installation; Committee email; Systems access review; Website update and social media review; Stock control system. This has proven to be a huge project and some of the key milestones are close to completion.

Resident Officers

Due to COVID-19 this season has created a number of hurdles to enable Hall hires. Both Daana and Jacob have done a great job as caretakers.

Club governance

In addition to the Building and Safari sub-committees the Club Committee appointed a sub-committee to review and make proposals to amend the Constitution. A number of changes have been identified for initial consideration by the Club Committee. All draft changes endorsed by the Club Committee will then be voted on as a Special Resolution at this year's Annual General Meeting. Thank you to everyone involved in these sub-committees.

Thank you to our sponsors for their assistance through-out the 20/21 Season: Bendigo Bank (Freshwater), Stone Real Estate and Sydney Beach Homes.

Conclusion

On behalf of the Club, I would like to extend its thanks to the Executive, Club Committee, Office Bearers, supporting sub-committees and Members for their commitment and ability to deal with the effects of COVID-19 through-out the season. For Lisa Settree, our thanks for compiling and proofing reading the Annual Report. To all competitors (Boat Rowers and Champion Life Savers), coaches, officials and patrolling members who have carried on the proud tradition of representing South Curly with distinction, thank you. Club Captain's Report

With the 2019/2020 season coming to an abrupt halt due the COVID 19 pandemic, there was much uncertainty and concern about what the 2020/2021 season would look like.

During the off season there was much to-ing and fro-ing as to whether the 2020/2021 season would go ahead and if so, how to manage things with COVID restrictions.

For a number of us that meant writing COVID plans (which is not in everyone's wheelhouse- especially not mine!) that adhered to Public Health Orders and the relevant guidance to keep our members and the community safe. We then had to impart this information to members, educating them around additional and altered practices. All this, as we know, was subject to change with the fluidity of the situation.

Despite the uncertainty, plans were in place, gear inspection went ahead in August and the 2020/2021 season commenced on 26 September 2020.

Patrol L kicked off the season with business as (almost) usual, following relevant COVID guidelines and advice. With the season underway, all was well until around Christmas time when the Northern Beaches went into lockdown again due to the increasing number of COVID positive cases.

Christmas patrols were not the usual festive Curly patrols where all and sundry turn up for a couple of hours of patrol. Unfortunately, we were advised that the flags were not going up and patrols were to be surveillance only with minimum numbers. At short notice I spent Christmas Eve contacting people to roster willing club members onto the Christmas patrols. A BIG thank you to everyone for your assistance and patience over that period.

Surveillance patrols and flags down continued but the gorgeous weather saw the public out and attending our beaches. Then with minimal notice whilst Northern Beaches still in lockdown the advice was for flags to go up and patrols to go ahead as rostered. Once again thank you for your patience and cooperation with this, especially at short notice.

The Northern Beaches came out of lockdown and our patrols continued as rostered, nippers were back on the beach and training and assessments resumed.

Our member retention is outstanding with the majority of our patrolling members returning this season. Our patrol numbers look healthy with adequate award mix across all patrols. Despite the cessation of SLS activities during lockdown, we have expanded our patrolling membership with the recent Bronze and SRC squads. Thank you to our dedicated training team.

The season finished up on 25 April 2021 without further disruption to patrolling activities. As I write this report, we are once again in lockdown - v3.0 for those Northern Beaches residents!!

I am hopeful that the 2021/2022 season will commence as usual but who knows what's around the corner? Until then stay safe and take care.



Treasurer's Report

It gives me great pleasure to present the financial report for the year ended 30 April 2021. I am pleased to report that our cash position increased \$53,648 over the year. As at 30 April 2021, cash and cash equivalents were \$368,651.

The income statement shows a net deficit for the year of \$22,778, but this includes \$119,957 of non-cash expenses; namely depreciation of fixed assets. Underlying cash profit was \$97,179, marginally above the prior period cash profit of \$91,522.

Capital purchases in the year were significant and totalled \$89,686, comprising the new security system and door locks (\$24,063 net of grants), other leasehold improvements to the caretaker flat, the cafe and club (\$23,736), gym equipment (\$7,008), a dishwasher and fridge for the café (\$8,943), the SSV (\$10,397, net of grants) and other club equipment (\$15,539).

The following are highlights from the income and expenditure statements:

Cafe "Gusto on the Beach"

Despite the challenging COVID-19 pandemic, the cafe largely operated for the full season, generating a \$63,000 surplus for the club, plus \$9,840 of equipment hire income and an annual Seven Miles Coffee rebate of \$11,607. The café operators did benefit from JobKeeper compensation, allowing them to continuously pay staff, even when trading revenues temporarily dropped.

Other income highlights:

- Membership subscriptions at \$56,795 were 2% lower than the prior year;
- Clothing sales remained largely in line with the prior year at \$15,215;
- Hall hire, social function and fundraising incomes were negatively impacted by COVID-19 restrictions. In total, income from these sources was \$27,719 below the prior period;
- The annual ocean swim event was not held in calendar 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions, but the event did take place in May 2021 and will successfully contribute in the FY22 financial year;
- Interest income decreased to \$3,951 (from \$8,428 in the prior year), due to timing of interest receipts and continually decreasing interest rates on term deposits.

Donors and Grants

A full list of donors, sponsors and grant income is included in the detailed income statement. Sponsorship cash income was reduced to the annual Seven Miles Coffee sponsorship of \$5,000, but grant income increased to \$34,098, with the SLS NSW grant up \$16,711, as part of its overall increase in assistance to help clubs through the COVID-19 pandemic. The club also received \$20,000 in government COVID-19 compensation. Sydney Beach Homes continued as key club sponsor and contributor to our surfboat activities, donating building material services for gym and other club repairs.

Expenses

Total expenses of \$262,461 were \$52,460 (17%) below the prior year. Depreciation expense was down \$13,324, with several older assets on the fixed asset register now fully written off. Clubhouse, lifesaving, administration and social expenses were all lower, with slightly lower activity levels due to the COVID-19 restrictions.

**NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2021**

NOTE 1 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a special purpose report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009, The Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012, the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 and associated regulations. The Committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

South Curl Curl Life Saving Club Incorporated is an association registered under the Associations Incorporations Act 2009 and is domiciled in New South Wales.

The financial report is prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

These are special purpose financial statements that have been prepared for the purpose of complying with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commissions Act 2012 and associated regulations. The Board have determined that the accounting policies adopted are appropriate to meet the needs of the members of the South Curl Curl Life Saving Club Inc.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the AASB and the disclosure requirements of AASB101 "Presentation of Financial Statements"; ASB 108 "Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors"; AASB 1048 "Interpretations of Accounting Standards" as appropriate for Not-for-profit oriented entities.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Goods and Services Tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO). In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset(s), or as part of cost of the item(s) to be expensed. Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable and payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included in other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Income Tax

As the company is a charitable institution in the terms of subsection 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997, as amended, it is exempt from paying income tax.

NOTE 2 CASH

Cash and Cash Equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturity of six months or less.

NOTE 4 PROPERTY, PLANT & EQUIPMENT
Buildings

Buildings are measured on the cost basis and therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. In the event that the carrying amount of buildings is greater than its estimated recoverable amount, the decrease in value is shown in the profit and loss statement as a revaluation decrease. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Plant and Equipment/Surf Patrol Equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. In the event that the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than its estimated recoverable amount, the decrease in value is shown in the profit and loss statement as a revaluation decrease. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Leashold Improvements

Leasehold Improvements are amortised over the estimated useful lives of the improvements, which do extend beyond the expiry of the current lease. The current lease expired on 30 August 2020 and is being extended on a month to month basis until the new lease is executed by all parties.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets, including buildings and capitalised lease assets is depreciated on a straight line basis over the asset's useful life to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held and ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Plant and Equipment	22.50%
Leasehold Improvements	10%

The asset's residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted, if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period. Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in the profit and loss statement in the period in which they arise. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation reserve relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

NOTE 6 CHARITABLE STATUS REGISTRATIONS

Australian Taxation Office:

The Club is endorsed as a public benevolent institution thereby conferring income tax exempt and Deductible Gift Recipient status.

Charitable Fundraising Act 1991:

The Club holds a fundraising authority (authority issued to Surf Life Saving New South Wales Inc).

Fundraising appeals conducted by the Club are often accompanied by donations. Comparisons of certain monetary figures and percentages in accordance with the requirements of the NSW Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 are set out in note (I) of the appendices.

Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) :

The Club is registered as a Charity with the ACNC.

NOTE 7 REVENUE AND OTHER INCOME

Revenue is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the company and the revenue can be reliably measured.

Sales of goods

Sale of goods revenue is recognised at the point of sale, which is when the customer takes receipt of the goods, the risks and rewards are transferred to the customer and there is a valid sales contract. Amounts disclosed as revenue are net of sales returns and discounts.

Function and Events

Revenue from functions and events is recognised once the event is held in the club facilities and the club has met its obligations to provide a venue for the expressed purpose agreed with the parties. The accounting treatment of deferring functions and events revenue is an approach adopted for the current and previous financial year due to the impact of the COVID-19 health emergency on events being booked at the club.

Membership Fees

Revenue from membership fees is recognised at the time of receipt.

Grants and Donations

Grant and donation income is recognised as revenue when received unless they are designated for a specific purpose for a purpose which has not yet occurred, when they are carried forward as prepaid income in the balance sheet.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rates for financial assets is the interest rate inherent in the instrument.

NOTE 8 THE C W DOODSON BEQUEST

South Curl Curl SLSC acknowledges the generosity of the late C W Doodson's Bequest.

The bequest enables the Club to utilise income whilst maintaining the integrity of the capital amount bequeathed of \$191,623.33.

The A crew final is generally the last even of the finals day, this day it was brought forward for TV reasons. The second last event of the program. There was a good start and our guys were right there with the leaders. There was nothing in it really until they all passed the gate cans, perhaps Bulli, the favourites were getting away. But then Termite felt a certain little lift and the crew responded with great power and surged to the lead and won the wholly grail of Surf Boating by half a bow tank! Gus Spiteri has an U19 girls crews that he inherited from Zulu at the end of 2019 – The Humps & Bumps – Nicky Berry, Mali Warneford, Braede Cox, Vivienne Saunders. Each of them in their other lives are very accomplished athletes. The U19 Women's Australian Titles surf boat final took off from the beach in a straight line and at the turn were all together, though Zulu's girls (who had also made the final) had a slight lead. Coming out of the turn, the Humps & Bumps were in front, he had made a very smart turn indeed. They then proceeded to gently increase their position until they crossed the line more than a boat length ahead. This crew has a very fluid, smooth rowing style, wonderful to watch and it must be a very smooth ride up the back for Gus.

Zulu's U19 girls crew also made the final and took the lead from the start, keeping a bow ahead of the field right to the turning cans, a quite smart achievement. They only lost a boat length in the turn, but in this company, that put them out of contention. However, in the scramble for the line at the finish they almost got their nose over the line for a medal.

I must say to have two male and two female junior crews making National Finals augers well for the future rowing makeup at South Curly.

Chief Instructors Report

Two seasons impacted by COVID, and at the time of writing this report we are back in lockdown yet again. In March 2020 the 2019/20 patrol season was abruptly suspended, and like many clubs we had disappointed club members that were unable to complete courses. In addition the 'off season' courses and upgrades that we were planning to run were impacted by ongoing COVID restrictions.

Right up until early September 2020 we were not sure whether the 2020/21 patrol season would be going ahead. Many enjoyable hours were spent keeping up to date with NSW Health Orders and SLS NSW bulletins, reviewing our Club's COVID-19 Safety Plans (even more fun!), and preparing guidance for training and assessments under COVID restrictions.

Between July and September 2020 the new Public Safety and Aquatic Rescue Manual (the 'Bronze Manual') was rolled out, together with the new Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) and Bronze Medallion courses.

To deliver the new courses all of our active SRC and Bronze trainers and assessors were required to:

- complete a Bronze Medallion induction covering the new online manual, resources and assessment tasks;
- gain or upgrade their Provide First Aid, Provide Emergency Care and CPR qualifications to meet the national Vocation Education and Training (VET) requirements (ongoing annual requirements); and complete practical training to deliver the new courses.

Thank you to our volunteer trainers and assessors for coming on board with this – without your dedication and commitment, we can't deliver courses and train our members.

For those of you who have not been involved with the new SRC and Bronze courses, notable changes are as follows:

- The new SRC course has been designed to be a logical progression to the Bronze Medallion, with SRC holders not needing to repeat some activities when they attempt their Bronze Medallion.
- Blended learning, with online self paced modules and assessments.
- Inclusion of an unconscious board rescue scenario with radio calls in both the SRC and Bronze Medallion courses.
- Oxygen, walk up spinal scenario, 4 person CPR, and final patrol scenario have been removed from the Bronze Medallion, reducing the number of activities where candidates are required to work in a team to gain their Bronze Medallion.

One related change is that only proficient Advanced Resuscitation award holders are permitted to administer oxygen from the start of the 2020/21 season. This change was the source of many gripes and grumbles from patrolling members.

In early September 2020 we learnt that the 2020/21 patrol season would be going ahead with 'COVID safe' practices in place and reduced proficiency requirements. Patrolling members were sent mandatory eLearning to complete and proficiency session kicked off. This year it was pleasing that there were fewer members that we had to follow up to renew their membership and complete eLearning complete so we could process their proficiencies.



Thank you to our Assessors, Delegates and helpers that ran proficiency sessions this season, particularly Michael 'Chuck' Berry, Kevin Moffat, Steve Birch, Jodi Le Geyt, Sue Hanley, Natalie Neary Matthew Campbell, Glenn Everingham, Craig Blake, Zara Howes, and our Patrol Captains.

In October 2020 we kicked off our 'Surf Rescue Certificate 2020' and 'Bronze Medallion Spring 2020' courses with COVID-19 still hanging over us. Mindful that training and assessments could be halted at any time, we kept the pace up and just managed to get our squads assessed before the start of Northern Beaches lockdown in December.

27 U14s completed the new Surf Rescue Certificate with flying colours. Due to the size of the squad and COVID-19 restrictions we split the group into two, with alternate mid week sessions and two sessions on a Saturday, which worked well as we were not training at the same time as the Nippers on Sunday mornings.

Thank you to the team that helped me train the SRC squad, namely Sue Hanley, Scott Stein, Natalie Neary, the U14 Age Managers – Saul Carroll, Graeme Smith, Steve Rudd, Bernard Blanchfield, and our younger patrolling members - Issy Owen and Luca Stein. As usual Chuck made himself available for the mock assessment and the actual assessment.

Our Bronze Spring 2020 Squad also fared well under the direction of Chuck, supported by Sue Hanley, Natalie Neary and Scott Stein. Some of our Summer 2020 'COVID' Squad returned and gained their Bronze Medallion with this squad.

Post the December lock down, we ran our 'Bronze Squad Summer 2021' (which also included some of our returning Summer 2020 'COVID' Squad) and a 'SRC to Bronze Transition Squad'.

We had an extended run of 'beach closed' conditions, which resulted in a few sessions at Manly Dam, North Curly and Fishermans Beach.

Once again we just managed to get our candidates assessed before assessments were cancelled due to COVID-19.



It will not be a surprise to anyone that Kevin Moffat was the organiser of most of the IRB training again this season. A steady stream of members volunteered for IRB crew and driver training, with Graeme Dominish, Chuck, John Colnan, Peter Allen, Lloyd Harrison, Matthew Campbell and Ben Webster assisting Kevin with the training. Chuck, Steve Birch, and Andrew Blenkinsop all assessed IRB awards during the season.

One area of focus for the 2021/22 season will be increasing the number of proficient Advanced Resuscitation (ART) award holders and ensuring that they can confidently manage scenarios especially with the changes to the Bronze Medallion course (which no longer includes oxygen, 4 person and the patrol scenario).

Our proficient ART holder numbers dropped considerably last season as a significant number of our ART holders did not participate in proficiency sessions despite offering numerous sessions on different days and times to accommodate members' schedules. It was disappointing that some members felt that keeping up to date with COVID-19 related protocols, refreshing knowledge, being familiar with our equipment, and practicing was a waste of time .

This nipper season might almost have been one that wasn't, but due to the massive efforts of many we overcame the challenge of COVID and saw many happy nippers' smiling faces and great times had building surf skills at South Curly. Starting under strict COVID planning, contact tracing, separation, and social distancing requirements, this made running Nippers sessions challenging. Unfortunately restricting our ability to have nipper parents involvement or close spectating. Turning this into a positive, we were extremely fortunate to have an influx of parents willing to step up and become Age Managers; almost doubling our AM numbers. Without our Age Managers, and tremendous Water Safety from patrolling members, SRC and Cadets, the season would have been far less enjoyable and successful for our Nipper groups.

The separate sessions for U6-U8, U9 through U13 and Rippers, and U14 SRC Saturday sessions did spread activities out over the weekend for some families; but resulted in increased use of the beach, surf, and pool for each group.

We were extremely lucky in the surf this year, with generally favourable conditions and Lifeguard "Deano" and his team really working with us to keep the beach open most weekends. This allowed our Nippers more time in the surf – invaluable for building board, swimming, and rescue skills – something we struggle with most years at South Curly. A huge thanks to our SCC Patrols, Lifeguards and Water Safety Supervisor Guy, for keeping the beach open and safe for our Nippers.

This year's U14s culminated their Nippers journey, successfully completing their Surf Rescue Certificate - SRC. Congratulation U14s, a fantastic achievement by the whole group. Many thanks to the trainers who steered them through the new course, and their Age Managers who worked with them for many years, building strong surf skills and getting them ready to achieve this milestone. The U14 Age Managers I'm told now plan on sitting back sipping lattes on Sunday mornings - but their SRC team I'm sure we'll have helping out on the beach! Congratulations to Evan Cahill and Amanda Cannon who also proudly represented South Curly in the Junior Lifesaver of the Year awards.

Outside of Sunday Nippers, there were some successful training camps held during the season. Treachery Cadet weekend (Ken's Camp) provided many of our older nippers and cadets with a great surfing trip up the coast in a relaxed setting. For many a first chance to escape Sydney last year and enjoyed immensely by all who attended.

South Curly Rippers All Ability Group

South Curl Curl offers a modified nipper program for children & youth with a disability and has done now for nine nipper seasons. The program has been developed and supported by the club to allow inclusion for all children, youth and adults to be able to learn about surf awareness and skills as well as participate in activities such as beach races, flags, wade and swim races. As members of this group become more confident in the water, they learn skills to be able to use nipper surfboards in the breakers as well as be supported by older and SRC club members to go out further into the surf to catch a wave into shore. Family members of younger rippers are encouraged to participate with their child so everyone has the opportunity to share in the excitement as each member masters new skills throughout the season.

Members of 'Rippers' are encouraged to join in their age mainstream group if they wish and are welcome to participate in both groups, there was one Ripper that wished to step up to regular nippers groups this season and has thoroughly enjoyed it. One Ripper who graduated a few years ago is still attending nippers in his regular age group. Both are fully supported by respective age managers.

The 2020/21 nipper season certainly presented challenges that no one has seen before, aka COVID 19. New rules and regulations saw the Rippers take on another challenge in a positive way. For many, Rippers is a social catch with friends whilst having some friendly competition.

Rippers were still consistent with registrations with approx. 22 registered members, both new and returning, ranging in disabilities and age groups, our youngest member 6 years to our oldest at 40 years. With other surf clubs now offering disability group, numbers will be maintained around this number for future seasons. As the Rippers group is diverse in age range, this year again allowed us to have two groups – one youth group and an adult group. With regular assistance from other club members (both SRC and adults) this allowed the group coordinator to be able to focus on individual needs more closely and achieve some surf safe goals which this year included regular 25-50m swims, wade, run swim runs and boards. We were successful in getting out in the waves quite a few times where all enjoyed riding the waves on boards.

Due to Covid, there was no annual Special needs carnival at Mona Vale, disappointing for all as it is an event that is enjoyed by all that attend. Our biggest highlight for the season was in the annual age group competition, where under the wet cold rain, the Rippers declined being in the final and were happy with 3rd!

As usual, Rippers attracts regular volunteers for our group and are wonderful, developing wonderful relationships along with our ad hoc patrolling surf club and SRC members. All volunteers are greatly appreciated and Rippers are lucky to have so many to help out.

IRB Captain's Report

As at the date of this report, South Curl Curl SLSC remains IRB ready to respond to any rescue situations with 3 fully operational IRBs with 4 Tohatsu 2-stroke 25 hp Motors at the end of the 2020/21 season. Surf Life Saving Australia has continued to use 2-stroke motors having been granted an exception to the Australian 4 stroke mandate due to the frequency of roll overs and maintenance issues. The club also has a full compliment of lifejackets as well as a rescue training mannequin and helmets. All motors have now been fitted with safety "kill chords" on their ignition switches, and all throttles set with springbacks to idle to prevent a run-away incident. Notably many IRBs from other clubs are not in this position, so we are well placed.

This year, the IRB was also involved in a number of emergency call outs and actions during patrol hours having been tasked by Surfcom and the State Operations Centre.

Operating at our beach, which we all know is an energetic and at times very hazardous break exposes patrol members to situations which call upon extreme surf skills and risk awareness/management. It is at these times our critical training as well as well maintained equipment pays off. Quite simply, it is well known the IRB goes out when other methods of rescue are not possible, and is often the first out last off in dangerous conditions. For the same reason, it is critical we maintain strong team of highly qualified personnel from our volunteer members.

This year we tried to focus on three priorities:

1. Increasing Operational Readiness of the IRBs including out of normal patrol hours
2. Increasing Safety around IRB use and maintenance and minimising injury
3. Increasing the proficiency and skills of crew and drivers (including those who have already obtained the awards)

In the 2020-21 season, the club was able to successfully train to completion 12 new patrol members in the IRB Crewperson Certificate, and 7 new IRB Drivers in the Silver Medallion IRB Award. Particular recognition to this goes out to our training and assessing team Kevin Moffat in particular, but also M.(Chuck) Berry, S Birch, A. Blenkinsop, L. Harrison, J Coleman as well as Graeme Dominish and Matthew Campbell (Content Specialist). In addition proficiencies were conducted in Spring 2020 with renewing award holders. All of this requires many many hours in the Surf with IRBs far above the normal patrol commitment of a member.

We have also aimed to maintain the IRB motors to a high operational maintenance standard, to avoid breakdowns in the break, consistent with our operational readiness and safety priorities. Further to this end, during the 2020-21 season, the club retired the Yamaha motor as maintenance expenses eventually became impractical to keep going for the oldest motor in our inventory, along with the danger presented by unreliability in the break.

Having two types of motors necessitated different maintenance training, different spare parts, different fuel cells and petrol mixes. Further, with Surf Lifesaving generally is moving away from Yamaha motors and this generated a further problem, training was become orientated towards Tohatsu style motors. The Yamaha motor was donated to existing club patrol members as part of a school project on boat construction, and potentially could be borrowed by the club on a future date if really needed. We are actively exploring a grant to obtain a 5th motor. Having more motors than IRB hulls is an essential to cover periods when motors are away for maintenance or break down.

The Club has also this year obtained a Side by Side Vehicle (SSV) which the Committee has determined is being maintained by the IRB personnel, given that the tools and maintenance procedures overlap. The committee has placed responsibility for this with the IRB section of the club. The Club Committee officially endorsed Kevin Moffat, Michael (Chuck) Berry, Glenn Everingham, Graeme Dominish and Matthew Campbell as the official SSV Induction instructors for the club, after they were trained and endorsed by Life Member of South Curl Curl Steve Atkins(Spider) from North Curl Curl SLSC. These inductors have already started inductions of all IRB personnel and Patrol Captains into operation and maintenance of the SSV, along with the caretakers, key members of club committee, Surfboat Sweeps, training officers and other club officials who may need use of it. The club committee has endorsed a policy restricting use of the vehicle to persons having a need, and holding a full NSW driver's licence, as the vehicle is conditionally registered and insured as it is conditionally licenced to operate between Queenscliff and Dee Why- with other use around Australia as SLS NSW may require. The SSV will make it possible to take the IRBs and Surfboats down to the beach and back more quickly, and in a safer fashion, and to various points of access along the beach for safer access including when Council Lifeguards are not available. This will cut time wastage for training, speed up emergency response, and allow roving patrols and surf boat training at the North Curl Curl end of the beach. This new addition will increase the operational readiness priority and the safety priority. The SSV is already in operational use, and it is the aim of the club to have all relevant persons trained up and formally inducted in Surfguard as accredited operators by the end of August 2021 in time for the season. Particular thanks to Peter Yeates, Club Secretary for all of his efforts in procuring the SSV Grant, the SSV and changes to board storage works in the board room to create space.

A new fuel cabinet has been installed in the IRB shed as a result of a grant, and we have started using a new air compressor (as the previous compressor had corroded to the point of being unsafe). A number of IRB personnel took significant amounts of time out of their lives to travel to, and work as officials and water safety at Branch, State and Australian Championships to support our competitors, in addition to providing these services at Curl Curl events. This involves towing an IRB to Palm Beach and to the Central Coast, and travelling to the Sunshine Coast in Queensland. Thanks go out to Kevin Moffat, Adrian Higgins, Terry Durnin, Martin Brennan, Glenn Everingham, Graeme Dominish and Matthew Campbell for donating considerable amounts of their time for this effort. Particular effort by Terry Durnin in re-wiring the IRB trailer to get the tail lights working for road use is particularly acknowledged. We are also trying to expand the number of IRB qualified persons who can provide this role. Also thanks to those who crewed IRBs for the Curly to Freshie swim and the swim from Shelly Beach to Curl Curl.

Finally, thanks goes out in particular to Michael (Chuck) Berry who continued on as IRB Engineer this year also attending on Committee meetings and particular maintenance efforts of our equipment and acting as In house Crew Assessor.

Suffice it to say none of the above could have been made possible without a lot of help from all of the persons involved, and anyone else who we may have forgot to mention.

People interested in becoming IRB Drivers or Crew are encouraged to approach us without hesitation to discuss the next opportunities. It brings a huge amount of satisfaction and pride when we see our IRB crews easily handle surf conditions that other clubs would not be capable of launching in. This is particularly the case when you hear it over the radio during an emergency call out.

First Aid Report



We purchased 4 Concept 2 ergometers in October last year ahead of the competition rowing season. Plans are being discussed for a renovation of the gym. Some early designs are being worked up to better utilise the space and upgrade older equipment. 




Active Membership (over 13yrs) 2010 -2021
